Nature Watch

Many of you have travelled on coastal steamers, and watched the gulls as they swoop around the boat. Flying, further away and often on a parallel track you see small dark grey birds, with bullet shaped bodies, and fast





flapping wings. What you are seeing are guillemots.

Guillemots spend most of their lives far out at sea, often in rafts with hundreds of other guillemots, diving now and then for fish.

Guillemots keep well away from people - you'll never see them in town! They only come to land to breed. They seek sea stacks, or small steep islands, where they are safe from meat eating mammals. They lay a single green egg on a narrow ledge, shared with other guillemots. The egg is pear shaped, so that it rolls in a small circle, and is less likely to fall over the edge.

Even on their remote resting sites guilletmots have enemies. Ideally one parent remains at the nest to guard the egg or chick, while the other looks for fish, but because of falling fish stock, often both parents have to leave the chick to seek food. And that is when gulls and fulmars take chicks.



Guillamots

Because of their vulnerability, baby guillemots leave their nests before they are able to fly. They leap from their ledge, with wings flapping, and legs spread wide - to land in the water

...behaviour changed

Recently, ornithologists have noted a change in guillemot behaviour. Once, when a baby guillemot was alone, neighbouring birds would succour it. Nowadays the neighbours are more likely to kill the lone chick, and either eat it, or push its body off the ledge. Scientists ask - is this a response to falling fish stock, or the adult birds seeing other chicks as competitors with their own chicks?

Guillemots resemble penguins but are rather smaller. They have dark grey heads and backs, and their under body parts are white, which makes it harder for fish to see them. Guillemots have large legs, which help them swim fast.

...not related to penguins

Guillemots and penguins are not related. Penguins are birds of the southern hemisphere. The most nor therly penguin colonies are in the Galapagos Islands. The similarity of penguins and guillemots is due to divergent evolution - where animals with similar lifestyles develop similar appearances.

Guillemots are members of the auk family. The most famous member of the auk family is the puffin. All auks are under threat. Global warming means the fish they pursue are moving northwards, and auks are having to seek new nesting sites, which are not necessarily available.

... over fishing threat

Again, over fishing is reducing fish stocks. Already one member of the auk family, the flightless Great Auk has become extinct through hunting. It would be a shame if other members of the auk family were to succumb through man's activity - but it is a possibility.

Okay, so imagine you and I are walking down London Colney High Street and we decide to call into the 'little' Tesco to buy some Pringles. (We're hungry). As we stand in the queue, looking at the magazines to pass the time, I turn to the bloke behind us and raise my fist.

"In the name of my friend, I punch thee!" I yell and smack him hard in the face.

The guy drops to the ground holding his dripping nose. You yelp out in bewildered shock. The woman on the till starts jabbing 999 into her mobile, staring at me nervously, backing up against the cigarette rack. Pretty soon the police arrive.

"Well, Reverend Laws," the policewoman asks, "What have you got to say for yourself?"

I jerk my thumb in your direction. "It was my mate. I did it in his name. Yeah I punched that guy, but really, he's to blame. Arrest him!'

Now I'm no Columbo, but that sort of argument will never hold up in court. There are a bunch of witnesses to the crime. Clearly, I'm the one at fault. You, my friend, did nothing wrong. Nowt. Yet, funnily enough, this situation happens every day, when it comes to God. Let me explain. I meet people who tell me that they have no interest in God or Christianity. Fair enough. It is, of course, our individual choice. Yet when I ask the reason why, sometimes I get the following response. "I know a Christian and they're not a very nice person"; "I went to church once and the people were really unfriendly"; "I was brought up in church and didn't like the minister."

That's a shame, of course. Churches and Christians ought to be friendly and welcoming, and it's true that sometimes us Christians can give off the wrong impression, (we're only human after all). Yet since when does a bad experience of a Christian mean that God is to blame for that? I mean sometimes people say to me, the problem with religion is that it causes so much war. Hang on a minute. Just because someone goes to war in the name of God doesn't mean that God approves of it. That would be like me blaming you for punching that man in the queue, just 'cause I did it in your name.

If you've had a bad experience with religion before, you might have decided it's not for you. I can understand that. Many people have a less than rosy memory of what church is like. Yet, can I encourage you to not write God off, just on the experiences you've had of the people who follow him? Most of us are pretty normal with the same sorts of challenges as you. We've just discovered perhaps the best kept secret of any generation. That God is loving, patient, powerful and real.

If you want to find out a little about God and the claims of the Christian Faith, we'd love to welcome you at our services. Fire Escape Plan

Did you know... a smoke alarm is the easiest way to alert you to the danger of fire, giving you precious time to escape?

If a fire broke out in your home, could you and your family get out in time? ...Do you know how many appliances you can use on one plug socket, before it becomes a fire risk? ...Are you certain your children know what to do in the event of a fire?



Hertfordshire Fire and Rescue Service want to make sure you and your family are doing as much as you can to stay safe from fire in your home. Paying attention to fire risks in your home now could save your lives.

Did you know... a smoke alarm is the easiest way to alert you to the danger of fire, giving you precious time to escape?

• Fit a smoke alarm on each level of the property and test weekly – In the UK 90 people die each year because the battery in their smoke alarm was flat or missing.

• Don't overload electrical sockets. Only have one plug in each socket. If you need more plugs than there are sockets, use a 'bar type' fuse adaptor and keep the total amps of all plugs in the adaptor to 13 amps or less. Faulty electrics (appliances, wiring and overloaded sockets) cause around 7,000 house fires across the country every year.

Who's got the keys?

•Know your escape route – make sure you and everyone who lives in your house know the quickest route out of the property in the event of a fire, and consider an alternative in case your usual one is blocked. Make sure everyone knows where you keep all the door and window keys.

Bedtime check

• Make a bedtime fire safety check - You are more at risk from a fire when asleep. So it's a good idea to check your home before you go to bed.

• Don't leave cooking unattended -Over half of home fires are caused by cooking accidents.



• Never leave candles unattended – keep them away from flammable surfaces or textiles such as curtains, TV sets or baths - More than five fires

You can also arrange a home fire safety check, during which firefighters provide invaluable fire safety advice tailored to the property and smoke alarms can be fitted on request.

Anyone who would like a home safety check can call Hertfordshire Fire and Rescue Service's freephone number on 0800 5873347 and arrange an appointment. Or for fire safety advice call 01438 737399 or log onto www. hertsdirect.org/fire.

All safety checks are carried out by uniformed personnel who will show an official ID card and always use an agreed password.

Mosquito Gets Wings

The fuselage of Hatfield built Mosquito FB.VI TA122 was delivered to Salisbury Hall from The Netherlands on 26 February 1978, followed on 27 July 1980 by the wing of TR.33 TW233 from Israel. While the spruce structure of the wing was still sound, apart from a missing wing tip, all the ply-wood required replacement. Over the 30 years since the assemblies arrived, a dedicated team has worked to replace all the ply-wood wing rib sections in turn, the spar webs and the wing skins, and replace the missing wing tip.

Meanwhile restoration of the fuselage has been achieved, repairing where sections had been removed for training purposes, and refurbishing both the interior systems and exterior markings to represent its former service with 605 Squadron in Germany, the only WW2 combat veteran Mosquito to survive in Europe. Rewiring of both the fuselage and wing has been completed to ensure full electrical integrity, the cockpit instrument panel has been restored and machine guns with armament feeds have been fitted in the nose. Restoration of the cockpit continues and replica 20mm cannons will be fitted under the floor.

As a celebration of the de Havilland Aircraft Heritage Collection's 50th Anniversary year, the fuselage has been lowered on to the wing utilising the same techniques and tooling used by de Havilland on the production lines. Because the wing and fuselage came from different aircraft, it was essential to be certain that they would fit together, as the only adjustment is fore and aft on the front fuselage mounted brackets. Plowman Craven with their advanced digital technology was able to scan the interfaces and confirm that they would fit. Work will now continue on fitting the undercarriage to allow the aircraft to be removed from its jacks and trestles, and work will continue on the wing leading and trailing edges, as well as the other many detailed parts in this Fighter Bomber example of the Mosquito, the only example of the FB.VI to be preserved in the UK.

World Wildlife

The fiddler crab is small, about the size of a walnut and brightly coloured. Its name comes from the male's distinctive larger right claw, which makes him look as if he's carrying a fiddle and a bow.

This crab seems to dislike living under water, and spends most of its time feeding on the shore when the tide is out, scraping organic particles from grains of sand or mud. When the tide comes in the sea washes over the burrow entrances, the fiddler remains deep inside, safely enclosed in a pocket of trapped air.

They fall easy prey to a wide variety of sea birds such as tern which swoop and snap up the crabs. They are found throughout the warmer areas of the world – the shores of the Pacific Ocean, the South Atlantic, the Indian and Mediterranean Oceans.

Crab-like creatures have existed on earth for around 650 million years. The main danger to their survival is the ever increasing level of marine pollution worldwide.

Gardening

Anne Kitchener

Among the many plants in my garden, perennials, shrubs, spring bulbs, there are those that regularly – or perhaps sometimes more annoyingly – seed themselves around the garden. These can be annuals, biennials or perennials and I can never be quite sure where they are going to appear or whether they will appear at all.

The plants that subsequently develop

keep it but change its position I have found that the best way to do this is whilst it is still quite small. I use a trowel to scoop up the seedling along with a clump of surrounding earth so as not to disturb the delicate roots and stems. The clump can then be easily transported to the new chosen space in the trowel.

The first self-sown plants of the year in my garden are primroses which appear in winter, often before the snowdrops, and last for many weeks as a background to the succession



can be useful and used to fill up an otherwise blank space, produce unexpected and surprisingly effective combinations with their neighbours or be in entirely the wrong place. The trick is to recognise the seedlings and not to just dismiss them as an unwanted weed.

Once I have, hopefully correctly, identified a seedling and decided to

of spring bulbs giving a welcome splash of pale yellow against their bright green leaves. Next to appear is pulmonaria with their mixture of pink and blue flowers and occasional pure white flowered clumps. As the season moves into spring and the primroses and pulmonaria start to fade, self-seeded forget-me-nots and honesty put in their appearance. Forget-me-nots form a pretty blue

carpet amongst tulips and other growing plants, covering the ground which later on will be filled by summer flowering perennials. Forgetme-nots will seed themselves in roughly the same places each year. Honesty spreads its seeds further and gradually moves around the garden from year to year so are more unpredictable but nevertheless are always welcome. Honesty's season of interest is then extended over the summer by the formation of attractive seed heads which can be left in place all winter. As this plant is a biennial it will not return the following spring, but the seeds set will form a plant which will flower the spring after that.

There are many summer plants that seed themselves, among them sisyrinchum, lavender, lady's mantle, ox eyed daisy, Mexican daisy and aquilegia. Sisyrinchum and lavender seed most readily in gravel which means they can guite easily be lifted and moved to fill an empty space. Lady's mantle and Mexican daisies seed themselves especially well in crevasses between wall and paving, the mixture of pink and white daisies amongst acid green flowers of lady's mantle I find particularly attractive. Ox eyed daisies seed themselves rather too readily all around their immediate area and to prevent over production I have found it is best to dead-head them before they have a chance to spread too many seeds.

There are many other flowers which will seed themselves around. The new plants formed can be left to grow where they are, weeded out and discarded or used to fill empty spaces around the garden. Selfseeding can be easily prevented by dead-heading after flowering and before there has been a chance to set seed. I have found that these flowers are invaluable and I enjoy waiting for where they will next appear and using them to fill up the garden.

Environmental Action

The Parish Environmental Action group has planned a number of small projects for the summer of 2009 following on from the work on the pond at Colne Gardens. These include the replanting of the "troughs" on the west side of the High Street between Kings Road and Wellington Road with flowering plants. Some funding for this has been obtained from the District Council under the improving street scene initiative. The maintenance of these beds will be taken over by the Parish Council from St. Albans District Council and Herts. Highways.

It is also intended to plant additional silver birches, donated by the District Council, in the High Street and adjoining areas in the late summer. The work will be carried out by the Parish grounds staff. A third project is the replacement of stiles with "kissing gates" on footpaths 23 and 24 to the west of Shenley Lane. This has been funded by Herts County Council through the Parish Paths Partnership in conjunction with the Countryside Management Services. These should be in place by the summer of 2009.

Parish Environmental Action Plan steering group members and CMS staff will be on hand to discuss the work of the group and environmental concerns at the Larks in the Park in Morris Way playing fields on the 28th June.
